The High School Injury Prevention Coalition is a group of personnel from local emergency services and hospitals that comes together in an effort to reduce injury in high school students.

We are endorsed by multiple levels of local governments and hospitals; however we are an independent nonprofit 501(c)3 group.

Our members are employees of hospitals, EMS, Police, Highway Patrol, Fire and Rescue departments in the low country.

Mission:

Positively influence responsible driving behavior in the high school student population by fostering a collaborative community effort to send a consistent safety message

Vision:

Responsible Teens Making Responsible Decisions.

Values:

We value responsible decision making within the community and use a teamwork approach to accomplish our mission through the dedication of our volunteers who remove their titles and jurisdictional boundaries.

Purpose:

The purpose of the coalition is to educate high school students about unsafe driving behaviors using the coalition's DUI Awareness Program. HSIPC aims to reduce the impact of motor vehicle crashes by improving student's knowledge and decision making skills. The coalition focuses on:

- increasing seat belt use
- preventing drinking or drug use while driving,
- reducing speeding and distracted driving.

We are in high schools across the Tri country region and we continue to expand. For each school that is currently involved in the program we bring many different safety events during the school year to get our message to the students.

HSIPC promotes best practices in injury prevention by identifying priority areas, improving resource sustainability, and advocating for policy solutions. HSIPC is dedicated to preventing injuries through community collaboration, capacity building, and action.

- DUI Rodeo (students wear "drunk goggles" that simulate the vision effects of alcohol and drugs while they operate a golf cart navigating a set course
- DUI Rodeo Texting students operate another golf cart while texting to show the dangers of texting and distracted driving.
- Candy handout to remind students to wear their seatbelts.
